Meet Priscilla Maxwell Endicott



Sometime later this month the PME scholarship committee will announce this year's recipients. The season is bracketed at the other end with The Endicott Cup & Tri-State Matches which bring together players from CWGA, Massachusetts and Rhode Island with GHIN not exceeding 17.0. (Sign up, it's a blast.) With all of this Endicott, Endicott, Endicott, it's a good idea to pause and ask, "Who the heck was Priscilla Maxwell Endicott, and what was her story?"

In 1899, just four years after the first Women's Amateur was held, Priscilla Maxwell was born the second of three daughters to Francis Taylor and Florence Parsons Maxwell in Rockville, Connecticut. Her family was well-established in the area, with descendants having fought in the Revolution including Ensign Gideon Roberts who was born and died

in Bristol. Lt. Col Hugh Maxwell, fought with the 3rd Massachusetts regiment and years later died at sea. Her father headed the Hockanum Mills, a major textile mill in the area. The family home, the architecturally significant Maxwell Court, is now home to the Rockville Elks Lodge #1359.

A graduate of Dana Hall in Wellesley, MA, PME's 1925 marriage to Henry Wendell Endicott was breathlessly described in *The Hartford Courant* as "one of the most brilliant weddings of the season." She was 26; he was 44. A direct descendent of Massachusetts' first governor, HW was described as a "businessman and sportsman of Boston" and the scion of the Endicott Johnson Company, a shoe manufacturing concern in New York. He was a member of 15 sporting and social clubs, as well as a host of

corporate boards. After giving birth to two children, Bradford and Priscilla, PME divorced HW in 1940 in Reno citing cruelty. Upon his death in 1954, HW willed the family home in Dedham Massachusetts to MIT. Having remarried 1950, PME settled in Greenwich but divorced a few years later. She died at her home in Essex in 1985 at the age of 86.

A few days after her death, the article "Priscilla Endicott; Boosted Essex Fire, Police Teams" appeared in The Hartford Courant. As a major contributor to Essex's volunteer fire company, she had been named an honorary chief. She also created a scholarship at the Cornell vet school to assist students from Connecticut. Her son died in 2019 at his home in Vero Beach. Her 92-year-old daughter lives in Acton, MA.

> In an interesting aside, her older sister Helen Maxwell Belding died at 32 with two young children Maxwell (8) and Virginia (6). In 1999 Maxwell and his wife Ruth would make a \$4 million donation to The Bushnell, the largest gift in the theater's history. The Belding Theater is named in their honor.

> > But a really important aspect of PME is that before she became the Cup and a Scholarships, she was a highly competitive golfer. At the time of her marriage, she belonged to Hartford, Manchester, Longmeadow and Agawam Hunt (RI). She most likely joined her husbands' clubs as well during her two marriages.

She travelled extensively, first by ship and later by plane. She spent her winters in Florida playing the circuit. Back home in Connecticut, she was a fixture on the CWGA and Hartford Golf Club leaderboards. She headlined a 1924 NY Times article for breaking the

course record at HGC during her second-round victory in the CWGA Championship. Nationally, though, she was often thwarted by future Hall of Fame champion and RI teammate Glenna Collett-Vare. PME's Hartford Courant obituary article said she was the second-ranked golfer in 1924. No doubt this second-place rank(ling) was to Collett-Vare. (And all of this dressed in long sleeves, long skirts and big hats! I'm sweating just during her recent thinking about it. The first modern commercial deodorant was developed and patented in 1888. But one does wonder where the term "stinking up

winning Curtis sisters, emerged as losers. As the 15th ranked

player, PME won her match to give her team an 8-7 victory to take the tournament lead.

In 1926, the first Endicott Cup tournament was held at Hartford Golf Club as a 36-hole stroke play competition between members of the Connecticut and Massachusetts Women's Golf Associations. The Endicott Cup was presented by Priscilla Maxwell Endicott for the winner of the competition. The plan was that the first person to win the trophy three times would retire the cup. Edith Baker won the Cup in 1926 and 1928 and requested that the trophy be perpetual, with the winner keeping it in her possession for the year. Our state's biggest winners are Lida Tingley (5) and Patricia O'Sullivan (4). Joanne Godwin of Massachusetts holds the record with six wins.

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On the Cornell University College of Veterinary Medicine website, following alphabetically right after the Poultry Scholarship Fund (given to those who demonstrate need with priority given to those with an interest in poultry medicine) is the Priscilla Maxwell Endicott Scholarship. PME established that scholarship in 1977 in honor of her vet — "...this scholarship provides support for students from Connecticut with creditable academic performance, personal attributes, and financial need." (*Her* scholarship did not specify animal interest priorities.)

In the same year as the creation of the veterinary fund, PME was solicited by CWGA President Jane Juel Swan to establish the endowment for what is now known as the Priscilla Maxwell Endicott/CWGA Scholarship Fund. The first awards were given in 1978 to Canton High School golf team member Heather Lowell and Carol Ann Taylor of Old Lyme and a Black Hall junior champion. The 2021 winners will be announced later this month.



Rules and Interpretations

When Your Ball or Ball-Marker Moves on Putting Green

When I was learning to play golf, my biggest worry was understanding the rules. I tried to convince my fiancé, who'd just graduated from law school, that he should become my caddie. In my mind The Rules of Golf didn't seem that much different than prepping for the bar exam. Franky, I was more concerned about the rules than I was about my swing. The syntax seemed stilted and, as a new golfer, I had no reference to the language. My first real tournament was the state amateur. It was there I first encountered the cape-wearing rules official who helped me count out one of my many 10's that day — "Okay, the first ball went in, then I dropped one, then the next one went in, and then and then...." I ended up finishing dead last.

There is no penalty if you, your opponent or another player in stroke play accidentally move your ball or ball-marker on the putting green. You must replace your ball on its original spot (which if not known must be estimated) or place a ball-marker to mark that original spot. Exception — Your Ball Must Be Played as It Lies When It Begins to Move During Your Backswing or Stroke and the Stroke Is Made. If natural forces cause your ball on the putting green to move, where you must play from next depends on whether your ball had already been lifted and replaced on its original spot:

- Ball already lifted and replaced Your ball must be replaced on its original spot (which if not known must be estimated).
- Ball not already lifted and replaced The ball must be played from its new spot. Click <u>here</u> for the Rule 13.1d video.


Upcoming Events

CWGA Membership: Any woman who is an active golf member of a CWGA member club who is eligible to participate in golfing activities at her club without payment of additional greens fees and has a USGA index of 25.0 or lower may apply for membership in CWGA up to October 1. Those who join after July 1 will miss the deadline for participation in the Past Presidents' Cup matches, but may participate in any other CWGA events. Complete the on-line form; it will be electronically sent to your pro for approval and then forwarded to CWGA Membership. Please encourage your club members who meet the requirements to join.
